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Preface

Its message must be studied, prayed about, discussed, wrestled with, and applied. It is a personal wake-up call for the family of God, my family. 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to the Lord with all our minds, hearts, souls, and strength. We need fresh fire (Jeremiah 20:9).

My prayer is that God will use this imperfect effort not only to wake me up but also to wake up my brothers and sisters—you!

Introduction

Wake-Up Calls for Some Christians

The apostle Paul challenged the Christians in Rome to wake up:

And do this, knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep; for now our salvation is nearer than when we first believed. The night is far spent, the day is at hand. Therefore let us cast off the works of darkness, and let us put on the armor of light (Romans 13:11–12).

Paul challenged the Christians at Corinth to wake up: "Awake to righteousness, and do not sin; for some do not have the knowledge of God. I speak this to your shame" (1 Corinthians 15:34).

Quoting from Isaiah 26:19 and 60:1, Paul wrote an application to the Christians at Ephesus:

Therefore He says: "Awake, you who sleep, arise from the dead, and Christ will give you light." See that you walk circumspectly, not as fools but as wise, redeeming the time, because the day are evil (Ephesians 5:14–16).

From these and other verses we can conclude that identifying the need for a wake-up call is biblical. In my years of ministry I have noted numerous reasons that some Christians need wake-up calls. While it is true that not every Christian needs a wake-up call, sadly, many do.

What follows is a brief listening of areas in which some Christians need a wake-up call. As you read this list take a few minutes to do a self-awareness application. On a scale from 1 to 5, with 1 being sound asleep and 5 being fully awake, write where you feel you are on the scale:

$__$ from having a hardened heart (1 Timothy 4:1–7)
from associating with the evilness of the world (1 John $5:19$)
$__$ from neglecting the assembly (Hebrews 10:24–25)
from not being on guard (1 Peter 5:8; Luke 8:12)
from not practicing love (1 Corinthians 13; 1 John)
from being afraid or being a coward (Acts 4:11–13)
from failing to bear fruit (Galatians 5:22–25)

CHAPTER

1

It Is Time to Wake Up

In her frustration, she entered the room with a third effort to get her husband to wake up and get out of bed.

"Harold, wake up! You are already late for work." Harold groaned and pulled the covers up over his head.

She continued, "They are waiting on you; they are depending on you to show up."

Harold pulled the covers from off his head and replied, "No! They don't like me. Nobody cares. It is just a waste of time."

"Harold, you've got to get up! You are the boss."

Many of us have had mornings like Harold had when we didn't want to wake up. Success in life depends on waking up, getting out of bed, and tackling the challenges of life.

We've all heard clichés like:

"Wake up and smell the coffee."

"Wake up and smell the roses."

"The early bird gets the worm."

Physical sleep is essential for good health, so nothing is wrong with getting an appropriate amount of sleep. When it is time to wake up, however, and we don't or haven't, our laziness can be disastrous.

It was the sixth of March 1987. The *Herald of Free Enter*prise, a ferry, was transporting cars between Dover, England, and Zeebrugge, Belgium. Cars were loaded through a front opening in the ship so they could be loaded onto the lower deck.

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On that March winter night, with 563 passengers aboard, along with vehicles, Captain David Lewry put to sea. It was dark, 7:00 P.M. All went well in the safe harbor. But one mile out, ninety seconds after reaching the high seas, the ship capsized and sank within five minutes.

On that fatal night the ship had sailed with its front loading doors wide open. There was no indicator light on the bridge to alert the captain, so he had assumed the sailor responsible for closing the doors had done so. Instead, he was asleep in his cabin. Because assistant boatswain Mark Stanley was asleep on the job, 193 people died.

While sleep is essential, there are serious consequences from sleeping too much or at the wrong time. The wise man wrote these words to warn us:

> He who gathers in summer is a wise son; He who sleeps in harvest is a son who causes shame.

> > -Proverbs 10:5

Do not love sleep, lest you come to poverty; Open your eyes, and you will be satisfied with bread.

-Proverbs 20:13

How long will you slumber, O sluggard?
When will you rise from your sleep?
A little sleep, a little slumber,
A little folding of the hands to sleep—
So shall your poverty come on you like a prowler,
And your need like an armed man.

—Proverbs 6:9–11

Laziness casts one into a deep sleep, And an idle person will suffer hunger. —Proverbs 19:15

While these truths are dynamic in a physical sense, they are far more so in a spiritual sense. Too much sleep may be dangerous in a physical sense, but it can have eternal consequences in a spiritual sense. That is why the apostle Paul warned,

"Awake, you who sleep, arise from the dead, and Christ will give you light" (Ephesians 5:14).

As Christians we are told to wake up. If we are asleep spiritually, we will suffer the consequences. The Bible is God's spiritual alarm clock for us. He has set it without a snooze button. We are called to be watchmen, to warn ourselves and others about the coming judgment of the Lord (Hebrews 9:27). But if we are lazy, sleeping watchmen, we are of little value. Here is how Isaiah described such watchmen:

His watchmen are blind, they are all ignorant; they are all dumb dogs, they cannot bark; sleeping, lying down, loving to slumber (Isaiah 56:10).

A reading of Ezekiel 3:17–21 will educate us to the duties of a watchman.

When Jesus was in the garden praying to His Father about His death on the cross, He asked Peter, James, and John to watch with Him (Mark 14:34).

Then He came and found them sleeping, and said to Peter, "Simon, are you sleeping? Could you not watch an hour? Watch and pray..." (Mark 14:37–41).

When Jesus needs us the most, are we asleep? Are we sleeping when we should be praying? Have we turned off the spiritual alarm clock? Do we keep pushing the snooze button? Are we waiting for a tomorrow when we will arise and be about our Master's business?

The ad said for \$9.99 per month you would receive one daily wake-up call and three snooze calls. Other ads offered more expensive and cheaper wake-up calls. Our wake-up call as Christians is the most expensive of all: the blood of Christ (Matthew 26:28). There is no snooze button because, if we love Him we will keep His commandments (John 14:15).

Jesus came to Israel to give them a wake-up call. But they didn't accept it. In Matthew 16:1–6 He rebuked the Pharisees and Sadducees by reminding them that they knew how to read the signs of the weather, but they didn't know how to tell what time it was for them. Spiritually and receptively speaking, it was the time of the Messiah. It was the fullness of time (Galatians 4:4). They failed to heed His wake-up calls and suf-

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fered the consequences in the destruction of Jerusalem in A.D. 70.

Christians, wake up!

Open your eyes to the condition of the world and churches. It has been said that only 17 percent of Americans attend church on any given Sunday. Atheism is the fastest growing religion in America. More church doors are closing than new ones are opening in America. Launched by the Master's marching orders to go into the whole world and preach the gospel (Mark 16:15–16), we have taken sanctuary in our buildings and complained about how dark it is outside. We have been arguing about deck chairs while the old ship of Zion is sinking. We have failed to realize that it has never been this late before.

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The battle is raging; crew members are abandoning the battleship or booking passage on cruise ships where the food buffet is open so passengers can pick and choose the theological diets they prefer. A paid crew takes care of all the duties, while we enjoy the fun and games created and led by cruise counselors. No one is manning the battle stations.

Christians, wake up!

Today!

Yesterday is gone and only lives as a memory: good or bad.

Tomorrow is not here yet; it is only a vague promise that may or may not come true.

Today! Today is here, it is ours to use and enjoy in the now moments of life.

We all need wake-up calls. Stephen Covey wrote, "In the absence of wake-up calls, many of us never really confront the critical issues of life." Life is lived in the present, in the here and now; we must free ourselves of all the foolish and useless trivia and make room for living and loving as God has commanded. - 7. Because the church in many quarters is being led into apostasy.
- 8. Because the number of workers is getting smaller.
- 9. Because we have a covenant agreement to be faithful unto death (Revelation 2:10).
- 10. Because it has never been this late before.
- 11. Because we have an eternal responsibility.
- 12. Because we want to be like our Father: He never sleeps.
