As I write this preface, I am lying on a bed in a simple hotel in Arusha, Tanzania (East Africa). I am two weeks into an eight-week commitment to do mission work.

In the past four weeks, 104 souls in the Arusha area have made the decision to put on Christ in baptism. On Friday morning, three men of the Maasai tribe became Christians. Our concern now becomes helping these new Christians stay faithful and go to heaven. One of my friends who studied with some Maasai told me, "Their trouble is they just have so much to give up." Heavy, heavy drinking, polygamy, and animism might top the list.

Really though, don't we all have "so much to give up"? Christ wants us to live completely transformed lives. As young Christian girls, our society screams at us with materialism, impurity, and all kinds of false offers of fulfillment. God wants to offer us something so much better.

Just as Christian Maasai have to live very different from their neighbors, so do Christian girls in America. We must stand out, refusing to fit in with the world so we can fit into the kingdom.

This book aims to help girls stand out. Eight Christian girls worked together to write this book for you. We know that living a transformed life as a young woman can be difficult, but we also know that God equips us with the tools we need to handle the challenge.

As Christian girls just like you, we know that we don't have all the answers, but we would like to share what we have learned as we faced struggles much like yours.

My hope in working with seven of my best friends to write this book is that the book will help young and new Christian girls go to heaven. Just like the 104 new Christians in Arusha, we all have growing, learning, and transforming to do on our way to heaven. As authors we are praying that this book will help do just that for young girls in our Lord's church.

Wonderful Words of Life: Bible Study

legend tells of a little boy who purchased an umbrella. He had been told that this device could keep him from getting wet during a rainstorm. As he headed home in the rain, he confidently held his umbrella under his arm. However, as he was nearing his house he was disappointed because he was drenched! Just as he was ready to discard his new purchase, the wind blew his umbrella open, and he realized that he had to open his umbrella for it to keep him dry!

Many Christians view the Bible in the same way that the boy viewed the umbrella. It lies on their bedside table or travels to worship neatly tucked under its owner's arm. Don't we realize that the Bible, like the umbrella, is useful only to those who open it and carefully look into its pages? (Acts17:11).

The only safe passage through this life is the one illuminated by the light of God's Word.

And these words which I command you today shall be in your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up. You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates (Deuteronomy 6:6).

Lamp unto My Feet

Each time we Virginians get walloped by a hurricane, many in our area experience life for an extended period of time without electricity. Though these times are always ones of inconvenience and much

frustration, we always learn valuable lessons from them. As long as it is light outside, life remains normal for the most part. But we have learned through experience to make the most of the daylight hours because when it gets dark, it gets really dark! At night, the only way to move around safely inside or outside is to use some type of light.

In a similar way, the only safe passage through this life is the one illuminated by the light of God's Word. This is why Jeremiah, led by the Spirit, made the statement: "It is not in man who walks to direct his own steps" (Jeremiah 10:23).

On the same note the psalmist penned the words in Psalm 119:105: "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." That sounds wonderful, doesn't it? God has promised us that everything we need to get through this life is found in His Word! (2 Peter 1:3).

What happens when we sincerely study the Bible?

- We grow to appreciate God's plan (Psalm 119:103).
- * We grow spiritually (Mark 3:33, 35).
- We develop knowledge that we can share with others (Deuteronomy 6:6–9).
- We can defend the faith better (Philippians 1:7).

₩ We have great strength during trials, persecution, and discouragement (James 1:2–3; Psalm 119:51; 2 Corinthians 1:3–4).

Take Time for It! (Psalm 119:97)

Have you ever been told to do something you really didn't want to do, and upon responding that you didn't have time, were instructed, "Well, you'd better take time for it"? We must apply that kind of discipline to Bible study. We can find time to do the things we want to do!

- * Eliminate 30 minutes of television every day. The time spent watching television can be spent going over passages of Scripture instead.
- Set your clock earlier. Get up 30 minutes earlier! Are you frustrated over a problem such as low self-esteem, betrayal of trust, or persecution? Do a study on this topic every morning.
- ** Walk or jog to Scripture. Get a CD or tape of the Bible. When you exercise, put on your headphones and learn while you work out.
- ** Memorize Bible verses in the car. We think nothing of belting out verses to popular tunes. Why not learn the Bible in the same repetitious way?
- ** Form a support group. Take turns reminding each other to read and study the Bible. Use notes, telephone calls, and emails to check up on each other.

TAKE TIME FOR IT

Find a "study-buddy" and choose a book of the Bible to study. Meet in-person or online several times a week for 30 minutes. This is a great outreach for a non-Christian friend.

- Who will be my studybuddy?
- * What will we study?
- * When will we meet?

Spiritual Starvation

Up to this point we have dealt with some reasons we should study the Bible. Now that we know why we should study, we will go over some suggestions about how to study the Bible effectively.

We need to study regularly (Psalm 119:148, 162; John 4:31–34). None of us would consider it okay to go several days without eating anything. Why? Because, it's just not healthy! Sometimes, though, we are guilty of doing without spiritual meals for several days.

It is sad to think that many Christians are starving themselves to death! We may do just that when we spend days without studying God's Word—and some "Christians" spend weeks without studying.

What makes our negligence even worse is that we have a feast before us, served by the Lord Himself! Spiritual nourishment is even more important than physical nourishment.

May we never take for granted the welfare of our souls. Be sure to get a nutritious meal every day!

Tools for Understanding

We have many resources to help us study. Most of us do not have to read the Bible very long before we find a strange or difficult word. Instead of skipping over such words, we can use a Bible dictionary to look them up. Sometimes that task is as easy as flipping to the back of our Bibles to an abridged dictionary. For a more thorough study, many congregations have exhaustive dictionaries in their church libraries.

Another resource is a concordance, which lists every passage of Scripture containing a particular word. A concordance is great for doing topical or word studies. For instance, suppose we wanted to study the subject of faith. We could go to concordance and find every passage that contains the word *faith*. A study of these passages would help us to understand the word in its context.

Other good resources to consider are sound commentaries, lexicons, and books discussing Bible topics and principles. We need to be careful about the religious literature we trust. Ask a qualified brother or sister in Christ to recommend sound Christian authors to help you narrow your search. Brotherhood publishers—those noted for publishing sound, doctrinal material—are always glad to recommend literature that will enhance your Bible study.

Organize your Bible study so that you won't let it slip (Ecclesiastes 9:10).

How to Stay Motivated

Motivate yourself by studying subjects that interest you. If you are fascinated by the miracles that Jesus and His followers did, do a special study on miracles. While reading a few Scriptures each day is a good way to familiarize ourselves with God's Word, it might not be the best way to gain knowledge and strength. In Bible classes and other public teaching formats, there is usually a selected topic discussed. We are wise to do the same with our personal Bible study.

Journal keeping also makes studying more effective. Keep a special notebook or
